The Sinking of the Kronan

A perfect case in music archaeology, based on the finds retrieved from the wreck of the Swedish Royal flagship Kronan*, foundered in the Baltic Sea in 1676.

* The musicians play on the same types of musical instruments that were found on the wreck, which exploded and sank in the Baltic Sea in 1676. All wind instruments, stringed instruments and percussions are represented in the finds that have been retrieved. Of the 842 men in the crew only 40 were saved. The wreck has been called "*Pompeii* of the Baltic Sea". Who performed music on board, for whom was the music intended, when and what did they play? The concert contains music that may have been performed in different contexts on board Kronan: in the Admiral's cabin, at the Regimental Prayer, in the Officers' cabin and at the Sailors' work.
